Biographical / Historical

John Taylor (1704-1766), English classical scholar.

Scope and Contents

Manuscript, in a single hand, of 11 letters by John Taylor to various friends during his years at Cambridge University.

The letters, dated between 1726 and 1728, are primarily jocular in tone, as in a comment to William Salisbury about his study of Greek: "I am willing to beleive, with the Saints, that Greek is a very Heathenish language, & that the very characters savour mightily of Antichrist or the Pope of Rome. But whether the Fatigue of studying Greek is answerable to the Fatigue of having nothing to do, I appeal to a Jury of Dutch Lexicographers."

Other recipients include Samuel Pegge, Edward Rynaston, John Holcombe, James Drake, and Robert Cholmeley.

The collection also includes a letter to himself, in which he writes, "I am heartily sorry for the very great mischeif you have brought upon yourself in desiring to establish a correspondence with me."
