Processing Information

Folder titles were supplied by Yale University Library processing staff based on document contents. Processing staff included names of people in the folder descriptions when they were identified in the materials.

Biographical / Historical

During the nineteenth century, around 125,000 Chinese people, predominantly men, were brought to Cuba to work as indentured laborers under conditions similar to, if not actual, enslavement. They primarily worked as laborers in the sugar industry, shipping, mining, and building railroads, among other industries.

Scope and Contents

Official documents regarding Chinese indentured laborers, often referred to as "asiático" (Asian), in Cuba in the nineteenth century. The documents include death certificates, new contracts, official petitions to the court, documents outlining the movement of workers, documents concerning fugitive people and imprisoned laborers, arrest warrants, and identification documents.

Some materials are arranged into groupings and are arranged chronologically within those groupings. Other materials are arranged in no particular order.

b. 1, f. 1	Socorro Spanish; Castilian Socorro, a "free" Asian person from Macao, age 32, died in the hospital.	1867
b. 1, f. 2	Crispin Spanish; Castilian Crispin, a "free" Asian person from Macao, died in the early hours of the morning in the hospital.	1867
b. 1, f. 3	Manuel Spanish; Castilian Manuel, a "free" Asian man from Canton, single, age 29, died in the hospital.	1867
b. 1, f. 4	Unidentified Asian man Spanish; Castilian An unidentified Asian man died at 9:00 pm, while he was in the observation room, of acute meningitis.	1870
b. 1, f. 5	Timoteo Spanish; Castilian Timoteo, a Canton native, died in the infirmary of the jail. He was a "confined Asian."	1870
b. 1, f. 6	Basilio Fernandez Spanish; Castilian Basilio Fernandez, an Asian man, was incarcerated in the Havana prison. He was a "confined Asian" from Canton, son of "incognitos" (unknowns), and died from cirrhosis "hepatica" in the infirmary of the prison.	1870?

b. 1, f. 8	Petition regarding ten Chinese laborers Spanish; Castilian A petition with a list of ten Chinese names to obtain permission to obtain a "recontrata" for them to work in a plantation (ingenio) after fulfilling their primitive contracts.	1872
b. 1, f. 9	Formal petition Spanish; Castilian Formal petition to have 16 "colonos" given permission for their recontrata.	1872

b. 1, f. 10	Formal petition regarding sixteen Chinese laborers Spanish; Castilian Petition for 16 Chinese people to obtain permission to obtain recontratas to work in an "ingenio" (plantation).	1872
b. 1, f. 11	Petition regarding fifteen Chinese laborers Spanish; Castilian Petition for fifteen Chinese people to obtain permission to obtain a recontrata after having completed their initial primitive contract working in an "ingenio" (plantation).	1872
b. 1, f. 12	Recontrata petition discussion Spanish; Castilian Manuscript petition from the Central Commission of Colonization discussing ten Asian laborers who have fulfilled their primitive contracts and are petitioning to have their Recontrata signed.	1873
b. 1, f. 13	Petition discussion Spanish; Castilian Manuscript from Central Commission of Colonization discussing the "Recontrata" of sixteen "colonos" in a sugar plantation.	1873

	Movement of laborers Includes three documents pertaining to the movement of a group of Asian laborers.	1874
b. 1, f. 15	Notification of agreement regarding a plantation owner waiting to receive Asian workers to put under contract Spanish; Castilian Notification that an agreement has been received from the Central Commission of Colonization regarding the owner of a plantation who is waiting to receive Asian workers to put under contract.	1874
b. 1, f. 16	Letter seeking to locate Asian workers and their documentation for an ingenio Spanish; Castilian	1874
b. 1, f. 17	Letter indicating that the Asian workers have moved locations Spanish; Castilian Letter directed to the Central Commission of Colonization letting them know that the Asian workers have moved locations.	1874
b. 1, f. 18	Manuscript regarding seventy Asian laborers working on the railroad Spanish; Castilian Manuscript, eight pages, stating that the Company of the Railroad of Puerto Principe has asked for seventy Asian laborers to work on the railroad.	1874
b. 1, f. 19	Document pertaining to Timoteo Chan, an Asian man, declaring himself to be free Spanish; Castilian Timoteo Chan shows himself to be "free," and he wants a papers, according to paperwork from the Portuguese Consult; he is not listed in an registry.	1872

b. 1, f. 20	Manuscript stating that Asian laborers have been approved to work at Ceiba Spanish; Castilian Manuscript states that a group of Asian laborers have been approved to work at Ceiba, and they are to be registered and provided with identification cards (cedulas).	1872
b. 1, f. 21	Manuscripts regarding moving two Asian laborers Spanish; Castilian Two manuscripts regarding moving two Asian laborers for the "Ingenio Asuncion" (plantation) to Matanzas. They were captured and delivered the same day. The second document discusses moving one of the Asian laborers in particular.	1872
b. 1, f. 22	Request for baptismal certificate Spanish; Castilian Document from the Jefatura de Policia requesting a baptismal certificate for an Asian male. His godfather is listed, as well as the man's "Patrono."	1875
b. 1, f. 23	Document pertaining to a fugitive Chinese man Spanish; Castilian Discusses an Asian man who arrived oaboard a ship. He has been a fugitive for four years.	1872
b. 1, f. 24	Document pertaining to recaptured fugitives Spanish; Castilian Document discussing money paid for two fugitive Asian people working for a sugar plantation who were recaptured.	1872
b. 1, f. 25	Manuscripts addressed to a Marquis discussing two fugitive Asian people Spanish; Castilian	1872
b. 1, f. 26	Document pertaining to two imprisoned Asian people Spanish; Castilian Discusses two Asian people in the Depository for Cimarrones (rebel slaves).	1872
b. 1, f. 27	Manuscript discussing the delivery of two fugitive Asian people from an "ingenio" (sugar plantation) Spanish; Castilian	1872
b. 1, f. 28	Petition to the court that a forty-year-old Asian man named Isidoro has escaped and is being pursued Spanish; Castilian	1880
b. 1, f. 29	Petition by owner to recontract laborers Spanish; Castilian	1879
