Processing Information

Louise Everhardy

Louise Everhardy (1886-1985) was an artist and educator, born in Kansas. Everhardy briefly attended Parsons School of Design and Columbia University. She went on to teach at several institutions, including Kansas State Agricultural College (now known as Kansas State University), where she taught applied art from 1920-1942.
