The library attempts to provide a basic level of preservation and access for all collections, and does more extensive processing of higher priority collections as time and resources permit.

This collection received a basic level of processing in 2013, including rehousing and minimal organization. Isabel Leighton (1901-1995)

Isabel Leighton, American actress, author, foreign correspondent, and civic activist, was born July 17, 1901 and died April 22, 1995. During her lengthy and diverse career she authored novels, plays, and magazine articles, was an associate editor of Vogue magazine, served as a naval correspondent in Asia during the

Second World War, and promoted mental health through public outreach and education. Leighton was married twice: to Frederic A. Willis, and to Arthur Hugh Bunker (Yale 1915, d. 1963).
