SUMMARY: Correspondence and writings document the life and work of Dwight Rugh,

his wife Winifred and their daughter Betty Jean during their service in China 1930-1951. The Rughs taught and did administrative work for the Yale-in-China Association at Yali Middle School, in Hunan Province. Winifred also taught at Shanghai American School, where Betty Jean attended for several years. Dwight Rugh was the last representative of the Yale-China Association to leave China in 1951, his application for an exit permit having been delayed

for several months.

circa 1902	O Dwight Rugh moved to California where his father was a school principal and later a professor of education a the University of California at Berkeley. The Rugh family, including Dwight Rugh's brother Charles and sister Winifred, lived in Los Gatos, CA where Dwight Rugh met his future wife, also named Winifred. She was the daughter of the town's Presbyterian minister.		
1921	$_{\odot}$ Dwight Rugh received B.A. from University of California and went to Hawaii, where he started the student YMCA at the University of Hawaii. Winifred attended normal school and taught Kindergarten in California.		
1924	$_{\odot}$ Dwight Rugh returned to California to marry Winifred and together they returned to Hawaii for three more years.		
1927-1930	$_{\odot}$ Dwight and Winifred Rugh moved to New Haven where he attended and graduated from Yale Divinity School.		
1930	<ul> <li>Dwight and Winifred Rugh were invited to go to China by the Board of the Yale-in-China Association, which sponsored a middle school for boys and a teaching hospital in Changsha, Hunan. Dwight Rugh served as director of religious education and counseling while Winifred Rugh taught music.</li> </ul>

1935	$_{\odot}$ Rugh family returned to New Haven where Dwight Rugh received a Ph.D. in religious education from Yale

1945-1949	<ul> <li>After the war was over Dwight Rugh returned to China to resettle the Yale-in- China school and hospital in Changsha. Winifred Rugh and Betty Jean Rugh joined him in 1946, Betty Jean Rugh attending Shanghai American School 1947-1949 until evacuated when the Communists entered Shanghai. Winifred and Betty Jean Rugh returned to the U.S.</li> </ul>
1949-1951	o Dwight Rugh remained in Changsha after the Communist army arrived. As the months passed it became more difficult for him to associate with his friends and to help with the affairs of the school. He was isolated in two rooms of his home and spent time playing his cello, writing poetry, reading, and writing long, frequent letters to Winifred and Betty Jean Rugh. Dwight Rugh was under surveillance and subject to frequent questioning, with demands that he confess to being an American spy. In 1951 the school gymnasium, which was being rebuilt with Yale-in-China funds, was completed and shortly after Dwight Rugh was put on trial and sentenced to be deported. He was taken to Guangzhou (Canton) and put in prison but after a few days was brought to the border where he could walk to Hong Kong.
1952	$_{\odot}$ Following a year of rest in the U.S. Dwight Rugh becamse Dean of Men at the College of Idaho
1954	o Dwight Rugh accepted position as Assistant Director for the Federal Point Four Aid program to Israel and Dwight and Winifred Rugh lived in Israel
1956-1964	$_{\odot}$ Dwight and Winifred Rugh went to Taiwan where Dwight Rugh was International Secretary for the YMCA in Taipei
1964	$_{\odot}$ The Rughs went to California to retire but later in the year joined VISTA, going to Norfolk, Virginia where Winifred Rugh trained teachers for the Headstart program and Dwight Rugh trained community workers.
1966	o Afer another brief period of retirement the Rughs rejoined VISTA and lived at Mammoth Cave National Park where they taught inner city youth in the Job Corps
1970	$_{\odot}$ Dwight and Winifred Rugh moved to Bristol Village to live nearer Betty Jean, who was now married to David Elder. They continued their educational work in various capacities.

### **Scope and Contents**

These papers provide valuable insight on the work of Dwight and Winifred Rugh with the Yale-in-China Association in Hunan province from 1931 to 1951. Frequent detailed letters to family and friends document the upheaval experienced due to the Sino-Japanese War and Communist takeover.

The Rugh Family Papers complement the archives of the Yale-China Association that are held at Yale's Sterling Memorial Library Manuscripts and Archives. Dwight Rugh's official staff correspondence and various motion picture films taken by Rugh are in the Yale-China Association Records. The Rugh Family Papers provide perspective on the family and personal life of the Rughs but also describe their daily work in Changsha and Yuanling. Letters of Betty Jean Rugh from her time at Shanghai American School complement the Shanghai American School archives found in Yale Divinity School Library Record Group no. 132.
